



Self-Reliant Ageing in Bulgaria: A Life Without Trust in the State

Widespread dissatisfaction with social policies and public services has led many people in Bulgaria to view independence as essential to securing a dignified old age. Since the collapse of socialism, Bulgaria has been marked by significant outmigration and declining birth rates, making it one of Europe's fastest-shrinking populations. With large numbers of family members living abroad, older adults are often left without traditional family support. In the absence of both family and reliable state assistance, self-reliance has become the dominant strategy for ageing — amid growing fears across generations of loneliness, financial insecurity, and inadequate care. These anxieties are deeply felt: 18% of Bulgarians report feeling anxiety about ageing all the time, while another 36% experience it occasionally.






Key Concerns
